Quotations:

On the Iran-Contra Dealings

Robertson:

You know, from a business perspective, I thought that was a pretty good deal, I mean you're making a little extra money on arms and you're sliding the money off the balance sheet and apparently the press just went into orbit on account of this.

On Lawrence Walsh:

Robertson:

This is really, in my estimation, an unconstitutional, certainly extra-constitutional type of endeavor. How much did he spend of our money and is he still spending it?

North:

He is still at it and probably going to tape record this one just like he tape records everything else, I guess. It is a constitutional anomaly, as far as I am concerned...I have no doubt that Prosecutor Walsh and the people around him, these young, ambitious, zealous young lawyers who came to this case because it was a highly politicized, very visible [case]. This is their chance for fame and fortune.

North talked about his book a bit, and about how he found Washington "unsavory" but encouraged more people to vote and become active politically.

CBN News did an extensive report on the Louisiana Governor's race. I believe this was Robertson's first mention of the election.

The report portrayed Duke negatively, as a questionable Christian, somebody who has been a member of the KKK, somebody who claims to attend a church that does not exist. Beth Rickey of the Louisiana Republican Party says Duke has "a real thing about Jews." Mention also of the danger to Louisiana tourism if he wins. Norman Ornstein makes an appearance.

Robertson:

What a choice to be faced with for those good people in Louisiana...(talks about national Republicans "meddling" while locals wanted Clyde Holloway.)

Walsh:

So what do you think?

Robertson:

Well, the tax laws forbid me to say who I'm against or for on this program.

Walsh:

Nobody cares what I think, I'll tell you what I think.

Robertson:

I'm afraid the same air time is paid for you as me.

Walsh:

You can express personal opinions, can't you. I can't say what I think?

Robertson:

I guess you can say what you think. We ought to get our lawyer in here.

Walsh:

Too late. I don't buy it. I don't believe a word he says. And my own personal feeling is, the Bible says, by their fruit you shall know them. And if he genuinely has changed his life, and he has so wounded so many people, then I want to see him out there making restitution to those people. And when those people come to me and say he's a changed man, I'll believe it.

Robertson:

Sheila, I think you've said the right thing, and you haven't said vote for him or against him, but you have said exactly the right thing. You don't get converted one day and run for governor the next. And especially the fact that there was a falsehood about his service. It did not exist apparently. Furthermore if he claims to be a member of a church that doesn't exist as well, there are a few little inconsistencies. Plus, there's some really bad stuff in his background. You know, all the way back, the statements and so forth, and, the nation, what'll happen is, if he does win, George Bush's opponents will wring him around the President's neck for the next year. It could just have shock waves, but as sure as you're alive, Duke wants to run for president, and so he will try to come on as the George Wallace of 1992 or 1996 or whatever it is. And it's a very dangerous trend in America to begin to foster hate, racial hatred, hatred of Jews, bigotry, that kind of thing. It's something that we just don't need in this country.

Special Report:

The failure of the "Liberal" Civil Rights Movement

The story included comments by Keith Butler, a Detroit City Council member, Alan Keyes, Rep. Gary Franks, and Robert Woodson of the National Center for Neighborhood Enterprise.

Robertson:

The liberal media wants to push a stereotype and the stereotype is the poor downtrodden black person who needs government assistance continuously. And there's a whole industry set up taking care, if you will, of the downtrodden. And any attempt that comes about to bring free enterprise, free market solutions will put an awful lot of bureaucrats out of work. That's why the black establishment, the civil rights establishment, doesn't want to let go because that means that a whole lot of folks that are tied into them would no longer be

necessary. They'd have to go get a job in the private sector. And Alan Keyes and Woodson and people like that, they're saying hey, let's go for free market solutions....

Since the Lyndon Johnson civil rights program, the Great Society, was introduced, the number of people living in poverty, the percentage, has virtually not changed. And yet we are spending hundreds of hundreds of hundreds of billions of dollars on programs that just aren't working. Because that's not the way to get somebody to...what we have to do is knock the doors open, get maximum opportunity, a wonderful education, and make sure they have every opportunity. But you cannot set up quotas and demeaning welfare programs and expect people to become self-sustaining. They just won't do it.

Robertson:

The people of Wearton are going to have some superior legal help against this bunch of atheists that's trying to destroy our country. They are awful. The ACLU is not a good group of people....In the Pawtucket, RI case the person didn't live there at all, and they picked up some derelict some place, used his name and used it as a cover to bring a lawsuit. I mean, these people are not nice. Now we're going to fight them. We're going to fight them, if they don't like it, if they think they've got a fight here, we'll take it to the circuit court, if it doesn't win in the circuit court we'll take it to the Supreme Court. They will have appeals on their hand every time they turn around. They have used bully tactics against unsophisticated city councils. It's all pre-printed, they push a computer button and out comes an injunctive relief request. We're going to match them case for case and argument for argument and we're going to start beating them.
