Robertson:

"When I was a Democrat, and when I was making a nominating speech in 1978 for a Senatorial candidate in the Democratic Party, I was one of the good old boys, I was one of the good ones...And Martin Luther King, if he had come out as a Republican would suddenly have been a right-wing fanatic instead of a wonderful leader of the people..."...[H]e's coming out against pro-family Catholics and against pro-family Catholics against Evangelical Christians, to deny them a place at the table...according to Fazio, the Democrats, they can't even vote, they can't even run for office. He doesn't want them to have anything to do. I mean it's outrageous. You talk about a violation of the Constitution."

3. The Anti-Defamation League has released a report charging the Religious Right with intolerance, hate and even anti-semitism.

Robertson:

"This report is every bit as accurate as the Protocols of the Learned Elders of Zion. It has no more validity than that. It's absolutely a packet of lies and distortion. But I talked to Abe Foxman, who's the head of the organization. You know what he told me? He said nobody should get into office and carry any religious

view whatsoever. I said, 'Abe, what about murder?' He said the only reason we should have a law against murder is because the majority of people think that murder is wrong and they voted against murder, not because God said murder was a sin. That was coming from a man who was part of the Covenant, because it's the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, the Sons of the Covenant. And the Covenant was what was given by God to Moses. So under this definition, Moses and Abraham were anti-Semites."

"The thing of it is, these secular Jewish people -- we're beginning to understand their agenda -- they are totally Secularists. They want no religious influence whatsoever. Even they don't want people in Congress who feel they're voting because of religious principle, Jewish or Christian. That's what the man told me."

Robertson:

"It's the last gasp of the radical left, of historical liberalism, and they're losing. They've lost in Russia. They've lost in Poland, in Hungary, in Bulgaria and Albania and Romania. And they're losing here and they can't stand it....[In the 50s] We didn't have gay rights, in that sense, we didn't have abortion on demand, we didn't have break-away marriages. In every school, where they wanted to, there was prayer, children were taught the Bible. And we had a moral consensus...How could somebody be considered a far right radical who only is asking for the way America was in the 50s."
