Robertson:

"I don't know if people understand that the genesis of Planned Parenthood was one Margaret Sanger. Margaret Sanger was in favor of eugenics. She wrote up a monograph in 1920 called "Breeding the Thoroughbred." Now Planned Parenthood vociferously denied that in 1988 when I made that charge. But I've got the documentation. It is voluminous on what that woman wrote. And she wanted to sterilize -- Ben, she would have gotten you and me. She wanted to do it to Blacks and fundamentalist Christians because she thought fundamentalists didn't have enough sense to reproduce and she thought Black people were inferior. She also wanted to sterilize Jews, anybody that had any relative whatsoever with a mental problem, anybody in Southern Europe; she didn't like Italians. She thought they were kind of stupid so she wanted to sterilize all of them. I mean this woman was a monster, she was an absolute monster. And she is the fountainhead of this entire movement which is getting \$100 million a year in United States federal taxpayer money, and who knows how much internationally."

"It's coming out of the Rockerfeller Foundation. The Rockerfellers like their money. And they want to keep it to a small group. And they think that these hungry mouths coming on, these third world countries will threaten their wealth. And so the best way to keep on to what they've got and not have the earth overrun by these hoards of poverty people is to kill them, either to sterilize women, sterilize men or abort babies. And it was "Roe v. Wade," the only justification was a pamphlet printed by the Rockerfeller Foundation."

This is an anti-constitutional outrage....They say that Christians, if they ever got in control of government would limit speech. Don't you believe it. The liberals think we would do like they would do, but that's not the way we operate. We believe in freedom."
