Reed:

"We found that 33 percent of the entire electorate consisted of self-identified evangelical voters who said they attended church four times or more a month and had had a personal conversion experience with Jesus Christ. That means that one out of every three voters whose shadow darkened the threshold of a voting booth yesterday was a religious conservative voter.... We have seen this group as a percentage of the electorate double in the space of four to six years. And as you indicated, they voted overwhelmingly Republican. It depends on how you slice it, Pat, but it looks like it's somewhere in the neighborhood of 65 to 25 percent, Republican over Democrat. They were the margin of victory for candidates all over the country. Let me just give you an example. We did a survey in Iowa, where Terry Branstad, the Republican governor there, came under vicious attack for his association with religious conservatives and his pro-life stand. Thirty percent of the electorate in Iowa consisted of born again evangelicals. They voted 70-30 for Branstad. If you took them out of the electorate, he loses that seat, 53-47...[This election] has established the conservative religious vote as one of the linchpins in a conservative governing majority."

"...most of the Republicans who won, by the way, by our count 28 of that 48 seat pick-up [in the House] consisted of conservative, religious pro-family candidates."

Sekulow on the Vermont printer case:

"This case is an example of what's happening across the country, where Christian people, people of faith, are being told when they engage in the marketplace, the commercial businesses, that they should surrender their faith, that their free exercise of religion somehow stops when they walk through the door of their business each morning....This was an attempt to take a legitimate anti-discrimination law and convert it into a club of oppression..."

Sekulow on school prayer amendment:

"There's a national momentum here. There is going to be a constitutional amendment on prayer. Now the logistics and all that have to be worked out. I'm leaving this program today, flying back to Washington D.C. to meet with Congressional staff leadership on the language. The American people do not want students walking into the school house each morning and being required to conform to the religion of secularism...Is it [an amendment to the Constitution] the best way? It only becomes the best way when you have no recourse, because the constitution in and of itself has served us pretty well these last 200 years. The problem is we pass all kinds of laws. We have the Equal Access Act. We have the Religious Freedom Restoration Act. But the reality of all that becomes students are still being denied fundamental free speech rights in the public school setting. And it may take just the thing of a constitutional amendment on prayer to inform the American people and raise that issue again that Christian kids should not be treated as second class citizens. I am appalled when I walk into situations in court cases, where these kids are being eaten up alive by the system and trampled on because they happen to be Christian young people, and it's just not right. And that's why you're seeing this tremendous grassroots movement."

"It is a question of freedom. And ultimately there has to be a clarification of this issue. You know where on these debates and People for the American Way and others will say, 'Well there's nothing that prohibits school prayer.' There is something that prohibits school prayer -- a school administrator that are [sic] confused or intimidated by groups like People for the American Way or the ACLU and others. And when I read a headline in U.S.A Today that says school prayer was completely removed in 1962 and there's never been any kind of school prayer again. That's wrong. I mean I was there in 1990, arguing for prayer and Bible clubs. But we need some strength."
