**Kennedy:**

"The spiritually significant event of this past month is the sleeping giant of evangelical Christianity has at long last finally shaken itself awake. That's what happened on November 8th."

"Let's consider the question how Christians should vote...Christians should be conscript to no political party. Christians should be conscript to the word of God. They should search the scripture, ascertain what the Bible says about any issue facing our nation, and then they should vote their Biblically informed conscience."

"If either of our major political party wakes up and smells the coffee and understand the sings of the time and perceives what is happening and embraces the moral, Biblical agenda of Christians, which has been the agenda upon which this country was built for hundreds of years, that party will be in power for the next century in this country. That is what really happened on November 8th."

"And Christians should be encouraged. They should be encouraged to realize that they are not losing and defeated and discouraged and marginalized, that they can make a difference, they can make a determinative difference in the direction of this country. We have had 40 years of secularist humanistic principles being imposed upon this country. that have brought about utter chaos and corruption. And I think American Christians are waking up to say 'Enough is enough.' We are going to change America back again to what it once was."

**Gary Bauer:**

"I think the important thing is that we not just get bogged down in the fight over the details, but we keep an eye on the larger picture of this hostility to religious faith that permeates our culture. I think that's what we're really all after in this debate on school prayer."

**Pat Robertson:**

"I have learned to my chagrin that in 1982, when there was a prayer amendment offered by the Reagan administration, insiders in the administration realized they didn't have the votes to pass it and yet they threw it to evangelicals as a kind of sop or bone. People went to the well for it; worked extremely hard to get votes in favor of it and yet there were about 18 or 19 Republicans who shot the amendment down and the people who proposed it knew that was going to happen. Now I don't think that evangelicals this time should get themselves hung out on some kind of limb in regards to school prayer, voluntary prayer, certainly not a moment of silence because we've already got that. And we've also got the right to pray voluntarily in the schools right now through Supreme Court decisions. It's a much broader issue, so if we're going to fight, we ought to make sure what we're going to get."

GUEST: Jay Sekulow.

**Sekulow:**

"The problem has been the Lemon test. We've talked about that I don't know how many times on the "700 Club." But the Lemon Test and the way church-state separation is being viewed does things like a nativity scene being removed from the public square, allows for a student to be arrested for handing out a gospel tract in school. So in the whole context of the school prayer amendment debate, what we're hoping to see come out of is it not just a focus on students being able to pray, but a religious liberties protection. That's what America needs."

**Robertson:**

"We don't want to get a fight on this thing, when we've got family tax relief, you've got budget cuts, you got the dismantling of the liberal welfare state."

"The language that needed has got to confront the Lemon test, not just let children voluntarily pray, which they can do now."

**Sekulow:**

"I'm not even sure the language that's proposed, Pat, will protect the student, because it says no person shall be denied. There are cases that say under the age of majority, they're not entitled to the full benefits and protections. So we're going in and saying if you add six or seven words max, what we want it to say is to protect religious expression in public places and not just limit it to what would be deemed a prayer at school, but affirmatively protect religious expression so you eliminate hostility toward religion."

**Robertson:**

"Nothing in this Constitution shall prohibit the religious expression in public schools..."

**Sekulow:**

"...in public schools and public places and may also use the word public institutions for Congress in the courts."

**Robertson:**

"That would be a major blow for liberty and it was one that would stop the liberal juggernaut that wants to remove religion from the marketplace."

**Sekulow:**

"And that's where we're trying to go with it. If we can get that kind of language in there, we can get positive production."

**Robertson:**

"Now that's worth fighting for."
