**Sekulow:**

"By revoking the tax-exempt status, they have done what I think is the most obnoxious form of censorship."



“Pat, I think this is the most important religious freedom case that we’ve probably handled in the last three or four years, because if the IRS is successful, they would be able to go into churches and begin telling pastors what they can and cannot say. Not only is that censorship, that interferes with what the Founders of our country meant by the separation of church and state. Keep the state out of the affairs of the church. The day that you have the federal government telling churches what they can say, what’s appropriate, what’s not appropriate, is the day religious liberty for all people of faith is in serious jeopardy. Interestingly though, Pat, they went after this church which took positions and sent forth in advertisements then-Presidential candidate Bill Clinton’s views on abortion, homosexuality, and condom distribution, but yet when Bill Clinton went into churches on behalf of Mario Cuomo not that long ago, five or six months ago, campaigned in the churches themselves, endorsing Mario Cuomo, said vote for Mario Cuomo. The IRS did not revoke those churches. That violates equal protection. That violates fundamental freedom. That’s a violation of the law that we are not going to tolerate.”

**Robertson:**

“If I were the IRS and thought you were coming after them, I think I’d settle this thing and back off...unless they want to take a dive on the thing and lose it deliberately.”

**Sekulow:**

“I don’t know Pat. I am hopeful that once the lawsuit is filed, which is being filed as we speak right now, that they are going to back off, that they are going say ‘Wait a minute. We are violating with some sincerely held religious convictions.’ You can’t tell a church not to speak on matters of Biblical mandate, which is exactly what this church was doing.... We not going to allow this church or any church to be told what they can and cannot say because the IRS doesn’t think the position of the church is somehow politically correct.”

**Robertson:**

“I’ve been studying in the last few days the tax code of 1954, and the reason the IRS is in court against a church is because of an amendment put in by Lyndon Johnson with no committee reports, no hearings. He put in on the floor. And it’s amendment to section 501-C3 of the code, you know, that’s say you can’t have tax exemption if you get involved in any campaign on behalf or against any candidate....It’s like saying you get the electric chair if you’re speeding on the highway. That’s essentially it. And it would seem the IRS would be glad to get it off their plate.”

“I think that particular part of section 501-C3 should be revoked or it should be modified to say something about a substantial amount as opposed to any case, any candidate, because the IRS has to define who a candidate is. They don’t follow the same rules as the Federal Election Commission. So this law puts the IRS into religious censorship and puts it into election analysis, which they’re not equipped to do. They shouldn’t be in that business.”

**Sekulow:**

“Absolutely. And what we’ve asked the court to do here is declare that provision that you just read -- that prohibition on getting involved in campaigns, or endorsing or in opposition to candidates -- unconstitutional under the First Amendment and unconstitutional and in violation to Religious Freedom Restoration Act.”

**Robertson:**

“Ladies and Gentlemen, I can’t emphasize how important this is. It was one little phrase sneaked into the law by Lyndon Johnson, because he got mad at the churches in Texas. That’s what it amounts to. This thing wasn’t set in holy writ. It didn’t come down from Mount Sinai. It came down from Lyndon Baines Johnson. And we’re now trying to roll back Lyndon Baines Johnson’s Great Society wasteful spending programs, and this is the area that gives an agency of the federal government discretion to destroy religious groups.”

There is no question that we must maintain the freedom we have as Americans. And we can't let any politician, however high his office, use this event in Oklahoma to still the voices of those who are disgusted with big government, who do not like the socialist welfare state, who feel that there is waste and corruption in government, and who are appalled at the attempt to take American freedoms and subject them to United Nations domination. This isn't some right-wing extremism. This is mainstream America. And we cannot allow those on the left to use this tragedy, and it is a tragedy, to still the voices of legitimate protest against the big government that is sucking up the resources of this great nation."

"And I think anybody who gets on television and points a finger of accusation at somebody like Rush Limbaugh or someone else, who is speaking out their mind -- this is un-American, and it is contrary to the First Amendment of the Constitution."
