And now they say, 'We wouldn't have to implant something under

your skin. We could tattoo it on.’ Because it’s possible with the technology that’s available, or will be available, to have a little tattoo on your hand, and that would be sufficient to record your life and death transactions. Now let me ask you something. When this brave new world is coming, where are you going to be. Where is your relationship, because the Bible says that those who take the ‘Mark of the Beast,’ who submit to this world system are one day going to find that they are in league with the enemy, and they’re opposed to God, because there will be more than merely buying and selling. It will have to do with religious faith and religious belief and worship of the central power....It will always be with an economic veneer. The economics will drive the politics, which in turn will drive the religion. And only those who are written into the Lamb’s Book of Life are going to be able to survive.”

Sixty-five percent want the Department of Education abolished. Sixty percent want the NEA and the NEH, the arts agencies, to be privatized. Every item in the contract enjoys support of between 60 and 90 percent of the American people.”

“If I were to say that there was a centerpiece, it would have to be the religious equality amendment, because for 30 years, we’ve seen a systematic hostility by the courts, by government agencies, by the public school against the expression of faith.”

“If Henry Foster is defeated -- and he now has five Republican votes, and he will probably get all the Democratic votes, which means that at this point, probably the only way to defeat the nomination is a filibuster. We would be in favor of defeating the nomination however we have to, because we just don’t think Henry Foster is the right person at the right time for this job. He is the wrong nominee for the wrong position, and after the traumatic episode of Joycelyn Elders, we need a Surgeon General that will heal the American people. We need a Surgeon General that can unite the American people. Henry Foster can’t do that. But even if he is confirmed, the reality is that he will hang around Bill Clinton’s neck like an Albatross going into the 1996 elections. He will be a symbol of this administration insensitivity to the concerns of pro-family Americans. If I were Bill Clinton, and I were smart, I’d be praying he doesn’t get into that job.”
