Robertson:

Now if you want to stop your money going to these organizations, and that is one of many, you need to call your Congressmen, your House member... Your telephone call is vital. They are within three or four votes of passage or not passage. This is a crucial piece of legislation to defund those organizations of a left-wing persuasion that have been picking up money from the federal government, your tax dollars going to promote things that your disagree with."

Robertson:

“The perfect government will be established during the Millennium. Jesus Christ will combine in himself the offices of prophet, priest, and king. This will be perfect theocracy, made possible because the perfect law of God will be universally accepted by all mankind...Perfect government comes from God and is controlled by God. Short of that, the next best government is a limited democracy...”

“There was no concept of separation before God and government in the Old Testament or the New Testament. The concept that was before us in the Bible is that rulers are ministers of God, that the sword that they wield is not in vain. They have been placed in authority by God to make sure that law and order prevail in our land and that there is no anarchy. Now when atheism came in under what used to be the Soviet Union, a new constitution was written, which said, ‘The State shall be separate from the Church and the Church from the School.’ In the United States of America, people have tried to apply that phrase from the Soviet Constitution to the schooling of children in America. Both of these constitutions are wrong. There is nothing that should indicate that God Almighty should be separated from the government.”

Robertson:

"Some nations are attempting to assert control over the thought-life of children through the teaching of anti-God values. Humanist values are being taught in the schools through such methods as values clarification or amoral sex education. All of these constitute an attempt to wean children away from Biblical Christianity. Another subtle encroachment

of the state into family life deals with the discipline of children. We have a severe problem with child abuse in the United States, and the state obviously has a role in protecting children from unfit parents. However, state social welfare agencies have been known to attempt to prohibit Christian parents from disciplining their children in accordance with Biblical precepts....Christians believe parents, not the state, must have primary control over children. This is where opposing values come into conflict. Some battles deal with whether the state can force a child to be brought up by a homosexual parent, or that two lesbians can adopt children, or that two homosexual men can raise children. Such cases are being taken into court, and judges and sociologists are making decision that are totally contrary to the Bible.”

“Although one-world government may sound appealing, I think it can be used one day for an Anti-Christ dictator to bring about hideous slavery and dreaded oppression.”
