So when these people get ready to vote, they better know what's going to happen, because I can promise them they are going to be voter guides in every single district that are going to show their vote on this particular issue."

### **Robertson:**

There are many bureaucrats in office today who are appointed as well as elected who feel that that's true, that the government and the state knows more about you and your family than you do. And that is a shocking carry-over, if you will, from socialism and Marxism."
