This ensures his masculinity. Above all, what is terribly important is that the family structure not be a disturbed one. **Robertson:**

“I think our position should be to get the facts, and once you get the facts, I don’t think you have any problem making the decision. You’ve got to cut through the rhetoric. You have to ask the President, ‘All right, what’s your plan. You have a plan. You said you have a plan on Medicare, for example. Well, what is it?’ And when you compare that plan with the current plan that’s being presented by Congress, the difference is

minuscule. So you're looking at not reality, you're looking at political rhetoric in order to gain political advantage... We've also have to be intelligent enough to realize that we can not as a nation just continue to spend ourselves into bankruptcy. Five trillion dollars is a lot of money... But the Christians ought to find out what the facts are on all these issues, and it may be there are some budget areas that favor the rich indeed, corporations and so forth, on the expense of the poor, and we ought to make a statement about that. We can't just blindly endorse whatever is there."
